The show is open at the Los Altos Public Library for the month of June. I hope you visit and cast your vote for the People's Choice Award. There will not be a reception for this show.

I'm hoping this is a temporary downturn as we are a busy bunch, but our Instagram entries have dwindled and I'm wondering why. Come on, y'all are fabulous artists, so what's up? Are we not giving enough notice, limiting the challenge criteria too much? Or... are you fearful of sending in your work? I would love to know your thoughts. 

The Park Brochure has directions and trail information.

We will meet in the shaded Orchard Glen picnic area located in the southeast corner of the scenic Las Trampas Valley. For non-hikers, there are plenty of spectacular views near Orchard Glen Parking area including a field bordered by woodlands and a stream. Hikers will walk along the flat Wildhorse Valley Lane to the Fern Loop Trail. This is tick season so dress appropriately. **Hikers leave at 10:15 AM.**

Washrooms: Orchard Glen Picnic Area, Interpretive Center, Oak Grove Picnic Area Park entrance Fee: \$6.00 Carpooling Recommended

Directions: From Hwy 280, take the Page Mill Rd (Exit 20). Drive 2.5 miles on Page Mill Rd. The Preserve is on your right. After entering and paying, drive past the lake, then turn left at the sign for the picnic area and interpretive center. Turn left at the bottom of the hill into Orchard Glen Picnic area parking.

General Information:

The usual start time for Paintsites is flexible. Unless a different start time is announced, the organizers will be there from around 10 am. Since a couple of the sites are remote where mobile service may be absent, the coordinators may be unreachable, or GPS inaccurate, please check instructions before heading out. Often people stay until early afternoon, taking a packed lunch to eat at the site.

Please note: Should inclement weather or unforeseen events cause cancellation of an event, it will be announced on the "Thursday Paintsites" area of http://www.scvws. org/ by 8 AM on the day of the event. Cancellation will also be announced by email, but the timing of SCVWS Paintsite emails cannot be guaranteed.

Meet in the meadow near the Museum entrance.


Washrooms: There are no "public washrooms" in the meadow area. Nearest café: <u>iJava, 387 Delmas Ave,</u> San Jose.

We have special permission to paint on the grounds of Maryknoll. This magnificent complex, including a chapel, was built in 1926 as a Catholic seminary for students preparing to enter the Maryknoll order. In the mid 1970s, it was converted to a residence for retired Brothers. The architecture contains Spanish mission, Baroque, and Oriental influences. There are also vistas of Rancho San Antonio CP and the surrounding hills.

Washrooms in the main building. Masks are required to enter building's washroom.

Directions: Take 280 to Foothill Blvd. and go south. Turn right at the first right, Cristo Rey Drive, and go about 1 mile. Go past the entrance to Rancho San Antonio (on your left), then turn right into the Maryknoll rear entrance. Park in the first parking lot on your right. Walk on the path toward the chapel and campanile.

Paint the Value You Want

You can't get anywhere in painting until you can translate values into paint on paper. This is true of every medium.

In watercolor, you have water and paint. That's all. So the basic way to get the value you want is to mix the right amount of water with the right amount of paint. The more water, the lighter the value. But the big question is, how do you predictably create the value you want? For predictability, learn to judge thickness on your palette.

Translate values into paint


It takes a little practice, but you can learn to create predictable values on paper by judging the thickness of the paint and water mixture you see on your palette.

Thickness = value

A dab of pigment in a bucket of water is quite thin. The same dab in a teaspoon of water will be much thicker. I like to relate the thickness to something easy to remember, so I compare the thickness of paint and water on my palette to the thicknesses of milk.

Mixing water and paint to a predictable thickness is one of two methods for getting the value you choose. After you are able to mix the different thicknesses in paint and water, you can achieve even more predictable values by choosing a pigment based on the value you want and then mixing it with the right amount of water.

Learning to mix paint and water in distinct thicknesses is a great way to learn to get the value you want. This exercise will help you develop an automatic and natural habit of noticing the thicknesses on your palette and relating it to value. Getting the feel of each mixture is important. It comes with just thinking about it as you mix. Once you get it, you will use it every time you paint.want? For predictability, learn to judge thickness on your palette.



VALUE 1 | Pick up a brushful of water and place the water at one end of your palette. Pick up a tiny amount of paint, say Ultramarine Blue, and place it next to the water. Gradually mix water and paint until you get something close to the thickness of skim milk. Paint a stroke of that on a piece of paper. This will be your light value.

VALUE 2 | Now add a smidge more paint to your brush but no more water. Place this mixture next to your first. This should look thicker than the first mixture, about the thickness of 1% milk. Make a second stroke on the paper.

VALUE 3 | For the middle value, you need to remove water from your brush by dabbing onto a sponge or paper towel. Then add a smidge more paint to your brush. Make a third mixture. This should look thicker than the second one, about the thickness of 2% milk. Make a third stroke on the paper.

VALUE 4 | Without removing more water, add a smidge more paint to your brush and make a fourth mixture. Make a stroke on the paper.

VALUE 5 | Here, heading to yogurt, add almost pure paint to your brush and make a fifth mixture. Make a stroke on paper. It should be your darkest value. If it is difficult to get the paint off the brush, go more slowly

and hold the brush in a vertical position.
